

Proposed Amendments to the Bylaws of the

Nevada Library Association

The NLA board at the January 16, 2007 and January 17, 2006 mid-winter meetings voted these proposed bylaw changes. Proposed bylaws may be amended by three-fifths of the legal votes cast, provided that copies of such changes have been circulated to the membership at least thirty days in advance. Voting of each bylaw proposed change will take place after 30 days by mail. If you have any questions, please e-mail the President, Debbie Jacobs at djacobs@washoe.k12.nv.us. Bylaw Proposal #1

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP.

Section 1. Membership Year.

The membership year shall be from January 1st through December 31st. Membership will be for one year from the payment of dues.

Section 5. Dues and Subscriptions Payable.

Annual dues shall be <u>for one year from the payment of dues</u>. due and payable by the first day of January of each year. Individuals may join NLA through August 31st for the current year. If they join by that date they are eligible to vote in the NLA election of officers. Individuals who fail to join on or before August 31st will have their membership fees apply for membership in the next fiscal year and are not eligible to vote in the election of officers for the current year. Individuals shall be notified, in writing of the change of membership status within two months after the date that renewal notices are mailed. If renewal dues are not paid by <u>their expiration date</u> May, they shall be dropped from the rolls of the NLA. Individuals so dropped may reapply for membership. prior to August 31st, but dues may not be prorated. Subscriptions shall be due and payable on January 1st of each year <u>or July 1st of each fiscal year</u>.

Bylaw Proposal #2

ARTICLE III. OFFICERS.

(The office of finance committee chairperson will become an elected executive officer and the section of Finance under IV. Appointed Officers & Standing Committees will move to Executive Officers in the handbook.)

Section 1. Executive Officers.

The executive officers of NLA shall be a president; a president-elect, who shall act as vice-president, <u>a past-president</u>, an executive secretary, and a treasurer <u>and a finance committee chairperson</u>. The duties of executive officers shall be those usually associated with these positions and as enumerated in the parliamentary authority, except when defined otherwise in these bylaws. Each executive officer shall submit a written annual report for the membership by the thirty-first of December of each year and shall be prepared to report at all board and membership meetings.

Section 5. Terms of Office.

All officers shall take office on the first day of January following their election or appointment. Terms of executive officers shall be as follows:

b. The executive secretary, treasurer, and finance committee chairperson shall serve terms of two years. The terms of the executive secretary and the finance committee chairperson shall begin in years alternate to the start of the treasurer's term.

Bylaw Proposal #3

Section 3. Selection of Officers.

The executive officers of NLA shall be elected by a majority or plurality of the legal votes cast for each office in <u>either</u> a mail ballot or <u>an electronic ballot by December 1</u>. to be completed within thirty days after the annual meeting. The elections committee shall notify the membership of the results of elections. Except where designated otherwise in these bylaws, appointed officers shall be appointed by the president with the approval of the board of trustees.

ARTICLE VI. MEETINGS.

Section 5. Voting by Mail.

<u>Electronic</u> Email or mail ballots not authorized elsewhere in these bylaws may be used for items of NLA business provided there has been an opportunity for discussion at a membership meeting or at district meetings. The elections committee shall conduct the balloting.

Bylaw Proposal #4

Section 7. Annual Audit.

A certified public accountant shall audit An internal audit will review the financial records of NLA annually and a certified public accountant shall audit the financial records of NLA every five years, and a written report of the audit and an explanation of the fiscal status of NLA shall be submitted for publication and distribution to the membership of NLA during the spring of the following year.
